Dear St. Patrick Alumni,

This past July, I replaced Fr. Steve Willard as pastor of St. Patrick's in Washington. Fr. Willard was transferred to St. Vincent de Paul in Peoria. Previously, I was serving as Pastor of St. Mary's in El Paso and as Chaplain at the St. John Paul II Catholic Newman Center at Illinois State University. I am thrilled to return to St. Patrick's in Washington as this was my very first assignment as a priest. From June 2012 to June 2014, I served as Parochial Vicar at St. Patrick's under Msgr. John Prendergast the first year and Fr. Willard the second.

My first impressions of St. Patrick's elementary school were that the St. Patrick's school families were committed and involved in the mission of Catholic education; and as I have returned six years later, I still see that same commitment in our students, our families, our faculty, staff, coaches, and school principal. We are very blessed to have such a vibrant parochial school.

I am grateful to Fr. Willard for passing on to me a Catholic school that has such a clear and devoted Catholic identity. In addition to receiving quality education from our very talented teaching staff, we have a student body that is growing in their Catholic faith. After all, our mission is not just to prepare students for their high school careers and beyond, but to prepare them for a life lived in Christ. There are many economic, political, and environmental challenges we face in our world, but none are so eternally important as the challenges that confront the human soul.

A Catholic education is at its very best when it teaches our children to integrate the affairs of the world with a life of faith and an experiential knowledge of a loving Savior.

As alumni of St. Patrick's, I thank you for the interest and contributions that you continue to make to our school; and I ask that you continue to pray for us as we strive to provide the very best Catholic education and formation we can.

Hello Alumni!

Welcome 2018-2019 school year! We are 251 strong with healthy numbers of students at each grade level this year. Our preschool 3and 4-year-olds total 38 students. Most of our classes have 24 students with 6^{th} grade being the largest at 31 students and 7^{th} grade the smallest at 15 students. All the other grades are in the mid-twenties.

Our school theme this year is:

"Change: Think, Change, and Grow" "Believe the incredible and you can do the impossible." --Venerable Archbishop Sheen

We have had a number of changes already not only in personnel, but also in curricular and extra-curricular programs. However, our "change" theme has more to do with each of us in our growth personally including growth spiritually and becoming fully the person God wants us to be.

We welcome our new pastor, Fr. John Steffen. Fr. John was with us a few years ago as parochial vicar and now is back as the Pastor. This is his first time he has had a school included as a part of his assignment. We look forward to working with Fr. John as we continue to move our school forward. Fr. Stephen Willard has moved on to St. Vincent de Paul parish in Peoria. He is missed, and we thank him greatly for being an integral part of building up our faith formation especially in the upper grades.

We also welcome the new teachers that were hired. Miss Cari O'Dea, alumnus, joined our team as a kindergarten teacher; and Miss Abby Brancaleon came onboard for first grade. We have two classes of kindergarten and first grade this year. Mrs. Cassandra Zidrich joined our team as the new fourth grade teacher as Mrs. Shannon Hughes moved from the 4th grade position to take on our 4-yr- old preschool position since Mrs. Monica Borrowman's family was transferred out of state. Mrs. Cagle, who retired in May, came back to be with us for another year to teach 1st grade as Mrs. Stefanie Hedden moved on to another position.

We continue to upgrade our curriculum. This year the big change was purchasing a new reading program for first through fourth grades. Kindergarten's program was purchased last year. The program has been well-received by our faculty and is very highly rated. Skills taught in kindergarten are built on each year. The series includes considerable nonfiction, social studies, writing, language, and reading skills. We have upgraded our second grade sacramental curriculum, and now we are reviewing a new math series for all grades next year.

In 2013, a group of family and friends formed the all-volunteer, non-profit organization called the Theresa Tracy Strive to Survive in memory of Theresa to bring awareness to one of the deadliest forms of cancer. Since the very first Theresa Tracy Trot — the group's annual run/walk and the largest of many fundraisers it holds each year — the organization has raised \$230,000. The money has been split between research and the Peoria-based Illinois CancerCare, which treated her. The donations have allowed CancerCare to start two new genetic screening programs for pancreatic cancer. These two programs are 100 percent funded by this Theresa Tracy organization. Without their funding, neither research program would be available. Alumni Tim Junk (1974), Mr. Don Evans (father to Kristen-1989, Jill-1990, and Patrick), and Mr. Henry Pratt (father to Jim-1991, Maureen-1992, Chris-1994, and Missy-1999) have also passed away from pancreatic cancer. Mr. Evans and Mr. Pratt were a part of the Knights of Columbus. The KC's hold annual fundraisers for this organization as well. Many of our St. Patrick parishioners and alumni have become involved in one way or another with this disease and the fight to cure it.

A very happy birthday is wished to Mrs. Frances Thomas! She turned 104 on Oct 29th. She is the mother of Jeanette (Thomas) Blackman, 1956.

Last April, the Priests Pedaling for Prayers arrived by bicycle and visited with our students. All along their 275-mile bicycle journey, they visited schools and talked about how they knew God was calling them to the priesthood.
