Dear St. Patrick Alum,

Although the school year officially ended at St. Patrick's Grade School on May 15, 2020, the students have not been seated in their classrooms with their fellow classmates since Friday, March 13, 2020. The Illinois Coronavirus Shelter-in-Place Order went into effect on March 21, 2020, and the students finished their academic term through distance learning. I have missed seeing and hearing their vibrancy during lunch and recess periods. I have also missed having the opportunity to celebrate Mass with them each Friday.

Frequently, I find myself thinking of our alumni, wherever you may now be. I have never met most of you, but I am conscious of the fact that, at one time, <u>your</u> voices and chatter filled the classrooms and halls of our school building, and you offered up <u>your</u> prayers from the pews in our church. Don Noe, 1975

It is hard to believe that it has been 45 years since my class graduated from St. Pat's. Memories? Lots of great memories of friends and teachers but here are a few:

<u>Mrs. Sparling, our 8th Grade Teacher</u> – The self-proclaimed "Big Bird" held court every day in "the Dugout" (her name for the 8th grade classroom in the basement of the school.) She was a small lady with a big persona. Big glasses, bright red lipstick, an infectious smile and an off-the-charts enthusiasm to teach important lessons to a bunch of know-it-all adolescents before kicking us out of her "nest" and sending us off to high school. What a fun year!

<u>The basketball coaches</u> were all role models to me – Coach Dennis Landry in $5^{th}/6^{th}$, Coach Bob Facker in 7^{th} and Mr. Greg Martin in 8th. I was always impressed that Coach Landry, who wasn't a teacher and didn't have a son on the team, would volunteer so much time coaching and I am so grateful he did. Coach Facker always exuded this coolness that I would try to emulate later in my volunteer youth sports coaching days. And Coach Martin – the yelling, the bulging eyes, the "BASELINE, down and back go!" when someone screwed up and we were all destined to run lines and the grueling "5 in 55s". His motivational tactics apparently worked as we had a 17-3 record as 8^{th} graders. I admit I "borrowed" a few of his lines/tactics in my later coaching days too.

<u>Sr. Mary Ann and the lesson she taught us about "volunteering"</u> – In those days, eighth grade boys were required (or so we thought) to be "patrol boys" (crossing guards at the street corners surrounding the school). Back when we were in the second grade looking up at these big guys wearing the orange reflecting belts telling us it was OK to cross the street, we thought "How cool is that? Can't wait to do that!" However, several years later when we were cool junior high students, being a patrol boy was not high on our list of things to do. Sr. Mary Ann made an announcement on the intercom "Tomorrow at lunch, I will be in the gym signing up <u>volunteers</u> from the 7th grade for next year's patrol boy duties. Please stop by."

The discussion among us 7th grade boys on the playground later went something like this:

"Did you hear M.A.? She said 'volunteers' for patrol boy duty."

"Yeah, I thought we <u>HAD</u> to do it."

"Well, if we don't have to, I'm not freezing my _____ off wearing a dorky orange belt telling a bunch of little kids when to cross the street."

"Me neither."

"All in agreement?"

"OK, we won't sign up."

Two days later, Sister Mary Ann was back on the intercom: "I would just like to thank the <u>two</u> fine, young gentlemen in the 7th grade who volunteered yesterday for patrol boy duty next year. For the rest of you <u>boys</u> who chose not to volunteer, I'm sure you will be pleased to know that in lieu of your patrol boy duties next year, you will be attending a new mandatory safety class before school every day in my office."

The subsequent discussion on the playground went something like this: "Mandatory safety class? Before school? Every day? In M.A.'s office?!?!?!?!" "<u>Noe</u>, you got to go talk to her. Tell her we want to be patrol boys!" "Me? Why me?!!" Randy Holzhauer: "Because you are the only one of us she will believe!" "Thanks a lot, guys!"

Next day I knocked on Sister Mary Ann's office door:

"Come in Donald" (I think she knew I hated to be called "Donald" but took some delight in it anyway.)

"Good morning, Sister. As representative on behalf of the 7th grade boys, I would like to inform you that we have given it considerable thought and reconsideration and we have all decided to gladly **volunteer** to be patrol boys next year."

"Donald, tell your fellow classmates that I accept their gracious offer."

"Oh, and Donald, thanks for seeing it my way."
