Dear St. Patrick's Alumni,

I wish you and your families a very blessed Advent and Christmas Season! No doubt, year 2020 has presented us all with many challenges. The pandemic seems to have taken so much away from us with shelter-in-place requirements, business closures, and various governmental restrictions. Especially challenging for me was the suspension of public liturgies in the months of March, April, and May. But, as I prepare personally and spiritually for the Christmas Season, I have tried to focus not so much on what was lost, but on what may have been gained.

I'll start with something simple. Last year at this time, I made the decision to get a puppy. I'd wanted a dog ever since I left the family farm to go to college. Throughout my 20s, however, I moved around so frequently that a pet would have been impractical. When I entered seminary in my 30s, a pet was impossible. Last December, I mistakenly believed that life—my own, in particular—was becoming more stable, so I bought a little Bichon Frisé named Starbuck. Three months later, stability shattered in a million pieces when the virus locked us all down. Starbuck became a good companion.

There is a reason why Jesus spends so much time in the Gospel teaching with parables of nature. The natural world reveals the creative mind of God and shows us the structures of life and death. Starbuck gets me out in nature every evening, and while he is sniffing fire hydrants and chasing wind-strewn leaves, I hold tightly to his leash and reflect on what Gospel truth nature presents to me in those moments.

On our evening walks, I am frequently reminded of Jesus's words in the Gospel of John: "Truly I say to you, when you were young, you fastened your own belt and walked where you would; but when you are old, you will stretch out your hands, and another will lead you where you do not wish to go. Follow me!" I love when those spiritual and theological truths of our faith are displayed so simply and lived so effortlessly by the things and situations of nature.

In addition to the companionship of a good dog, I have also gained a greater appreciation for silence and stillness. When we received notice from the diocese in mid-March that we had to suspend public liturgies, I celebrated all of my daily masses in the small chapel in the St. Pat's rectory. Pre-Covid, almost every mass a priest celebrates is a public mass held in a consecrated church, so Fr. Thaddeus and I mostly use our private chapel for personal prayer. Rarely do we get to offer a full mass there. One of the things I learned from those quiet, whispered chapel masses is the paradox of silence in our Catholic tradition. Silence isn't really so silent or isolating.

With greater attention focused on the actions of the Mass, the prayers—both spoken and secret—I sensed the universality of what the Holy Mass truly is. It unites heaven and earth. It is the source and summit of our lives as Catholics. It is activity both visible and invisible, as we announce in the Nicene Creed.

In reality, there is a nearness we can find in the Holy Eucharist that collapses the distance between God and Man, between citizens of this world and the world that knows no end, and between shepherd and flock.

I placed the parish directories of both St. Patrick's and St. Monica's on the altar each time I celebrated Mass during those months, holding each of you up to Our Heavenly Father. I felt near to all of you during that time in spite of physical restrictions. This experience of nearness was especially meaningful to me this year, as my dear friend, Msgr. John J. Prendergast, was called out of this world and into the next. The reality is exactly as St. Paul describes: *Christ is all, and in all*.

A third gain came to me this year when we were able to begin distributing Holy Communion in the parking lots at both St. Patrick's and St. Monica's in June. It felt like a great cloud had lifted. Seeing so many of you come through the communion lanes in the parking lots was like being part of a long-awaited reunion. But, even more meaningful to me than our own encounters was seeing you receive the Holy Eucharist after so many weeks. Some of you had tears running down your cheeks. Some of you had smiles stretched from ear to ear. It was as if we had all come out from under the drifts of a terrible winter to see light and life at last. In fact, that's exactly what the Eucharist gives us: light amid encircling gloom and life in abundance.

I am so grateful to be assigned as Pastor at St. Patrick's and St. Monica's! I thank all of you who have helped keep our parishes active and alive throughout these past months, and I pray that as life hopefully returns to a Covid-free normal, we can gather fully as a family in faith. On a personal level, I pray that 2021 brings you and me more of what I have gained from 2020: the everpresent nearness of God. I also pray that you and your families enjoy health and happiness and salvation!

Newspaper Clipping September 14, 1952:

Dear Alumni,

I hope this letter finds you all well and safe. The Coronavirus really turned our world upside down. As a result, we have had quite an unusual turn in how we deliver education to our students. During the last quarter of 2019-2020 school year, we began remote learning due to the "shelter in place" order requiring the temporary closure of schools. Our students missed all of the spring events such as May Crowning, First Communion, Awards Nights, State Track Meet, and other traditions that have become an integral part of St. Patrick School. We held Graduation at the end of July with only parents and the graduates attending to keep within guidelines from the State and the Diocese of Peoria. Fortunately, we were able to be back in school in-person for thirteen weeks this school year before being required to return to remote learning. We have put in place many safety measures and precautions to keep our students and teachers safe. We hope to be back in-person full time again in mid-January. It is hard, as students miss their friends and their teachers. Planning e-learning lessons require so much more work, and our faculty has been real troopers.

Fortunately, we had the technology available so that we could provide students help with the challenge of remote learning. St. Patrick School has 1:1 technology available to students for this school year. However, our new challenge is to keep this program going in the years to come. When the 2021-2022 school year begins, the majority of our Chromebooks will no longer be able to accept the updates requiring us to replace them. This will be a major expense. Technology is so integral in the curriculum of today's education including some of our textbooks that are completely online and Smart Boards in the classrooms. Students use the Chromebooks daily in school or remote learning.

We continue to work hard to provide top-notch education for our students in academics and faith formation. Four of our alumni placed in the Top Ten at Washington Community High School this past school year; and many of our students were inducted into the National Honor Society at WCHS, Peoria Notre Dame, and high schools elsewhere. How wonderful is that! St. Patrick School is a great school! We love our students and families! We will continue to provide the best for our students. Please keep us in your prayers, and keep healthy and safe!
